The Jews of Poland



The story of the Jews of Poland can be divided into two major chapters: before and after the Holocaust. Before the Holocaust, Jews were the largest minority in Poland, and while antisemitism may have permeated significant pockets of the greater Polish culture, Jews and Poles lived side by side for centuries. Jews spoke Polish. Poles spoke Yiddish. They interacted with each other in the streets, in the market place and in their places of business. For hundreds of years, Jews were part of Poland, and Polish culture was, in part, Jewish.

This strong Jewish presence began in the Middle Ages, as the Jews of Europe fled from the Crusaders in the thirteenth century. In 1264, the Statute of Kalisz created legal protections for Jews which were later extended by King Kazimierz Wielki (Casimir the Great) in the early fourteenth century.

These legal protections created an environment of relative autonomy and tolerance. As a result, the Jews of Poland developed a rich social and cultural life, and by the sixteenth century, nearly 80 percent of the world's Jewish population lived in Poland.

The relatively peaceful existence of Polish Jewry led to the rise of several significant religious movements. Among the most recognizable today is the Hasidic community, which continues to wear the same clothing (black hats and long black coats) as was worn in the 1800's in Poland.

For centuries, the Jews of Poland lived in shtetls, and with the exception of a small minority of well-off Jewish merchants, bankers and factory owners, most Jews were poor. They made a living as traders, semi-skilled craftsmen and shopkeepers.

With the industrial revolution, most Jews migrated from the shtetl to larger urban centers such as Warsaw, Vilna, Krakow, and Lodz. These cities became the cultural, religious, and intellectual centers of world Jewry. With such a vibrant population, Jews developed extensive networks of cultural and literary institutions. From this dynamic community emerged a wellspring of religious trends, new political theories and ideologies including Zionism and socialism. These ideas and many others were explored in thousands of newspapers, books, journals and plays (mostly in Yiddish).

At the end of the eighteenth century, Poland was partitioned between Russia, Prussia, and Austria. This partition left a majority of the Polish Jewish population under harsh Russian policies and subjected to strict geographic and professional restrictions. The Jews of this territory (which is known as the Pale of Settlement) were forbidden to live outside of this region.

In the 1880s and 1890s, anti-Semitic violence surfaced throughout the Pale of Settlement in the form of organized massacres called pogroms. In response to this new reality of hate and intolerance, two million Jews emigrated out of this region. Most of them flee to the United States. Others, inspired by the teachings of Zionism, migrate to Palestine. Even after this mass exodus, the Jewish population of Poland continued to be the highest percentage of Jews in any European country. On the eve of World War II, three and a half million Jews (approximately ten percent of the Jewish population) still lived in Poland.

When the Nazis set their sights on Poland, they placed their major killing centers there with a railway system that could efficiently bring Jews and other prisoners from their homelands to be murdered in the camps. By the end of the war, nearly five million Poles died—including three million Jews and 1.9 million non-Jewish Polish citizens.

Fewer than 10,000 Jews live in Poland today, but the legacy of Polish Jewry remains through the ideologies, religious movements and cultural treasures which emerged from one of the most dynamic Jewish communities in history. 
Planning a Party? Bar/Bat Mitzvah? Join us for HCRJ's 6th Annual Vendor Fair 10:30AM to 12:30PM


