### **Book Discussion: The Edge of the Sticker**

A Guide for Getting Through Life's Challenges with Authors Bradley and Bobby Frank Sunday, January 22 at 10:30am



Our first book talk of 2023 at HCRJ is on Sunday, January 22nd at 10:30am! HCRJ member Bradley Frank and his brother, Bobby, will discuss their book, *The Edge of the Sticker – A Guide for Getting Through Life's Challenges*!

Have you ever tried peeling a sticker off your car? You probably start by looking for a corner that's raised just enough to get your fingernail underneath. Once you've got that edge, though, you can gently pull it away. Sometimes the sticker comes right off with one satisfying tug. Sometimes it tears or separates and you have to start over. Either way, the

process begins by getting the edge of the sticker. The same idea applies when life gets sticky. Life is stressful and everyone feels anxious or depressed at times, even people who appear to have it all under control. While it's easy to get stuck and feel like there's no way out, the path to feeling better begins by getting an edge, slowly pulling and changing course as life shifts underneath you.

The Edge of the Sticker was inspired by the collective psychological struggles we all faced during the pandemic. It tested our grit and resolve, and it proved that we could adapt even when faced with crushing uncertainty. This book brings together some of the lessons the authors learned from Covid with strategies developed over nearly 30 years of providing psychotherapy for mental health challenges of all kinds.

### A Message from HCRJ's Religious School Director: Betti Buck

Rudolph Steiner founded The Waldorf School. This worldwide network of schools is based on educational values of gratitude, responsibility, collaboration, inclusivity, diversity, and initiative. Steiner's educational philosophy, also known as Anthroposophy, seeks to cultivate the creative potential in students. I have had the privilege of studying and teaching this educational model in Israel, and I strongly believe that this multidisciplinary approach to learning through art, music, storytelling, and other hands-on experiences is best for our children.

When I was interviewing for position of religious school director, Rabbi Steve shared the innovative HCRJ rotations curriculum with me, and my eyes lit up. The HCRJ approach to learning had inadvertently embraced the kind of educational strategies I believe in, and I knew right away that HCRJ is where I wanted to be. It is my absolute honor to be a part of this adventure in Jewish education that is based on the very same values of The Waldorf Schools in a community that is warm, inviting, and supportive.

The Hebrew word for community (as well as congregation) is *Kehilla*. It can be argued that a sense of belonging (a sense of *Kehilla*) is a basic human need. Building and strengthening our *Kehilla* is one of the primary goals of our religious school. This is done through learning the language and prayers of our faith, embracing wonderful traditions, and celebrating holidays and life cycle events.





At HCRJ, we understand this process to be collaborative, and our religious school strives to engage the entire family in the process of transmitting these values across the generations. It is in the spirit of this multi-generational approach to *Kehilla*, that I have created a grade-by-grade framework for Jewish identity formation. What does this look like?

It all begins with the consecration of our kindergarteners. Then, each successive year special family learning opportunities have been created to generate community, learning and celebration.

Our first and second grade students will explore sacred heirlooms with their parents, grandparents, and great grandparents. These

family treasures encourage the sharing of stories that become the basis for a personal Jewish identity. This program is called *L'dor V'dor*, and we will celebrate as a community on Sunday, February 12.

Our third graders will celebrate the completion of learning how to read Hebrew with a special ceremony called *M'sibat Siddur*. At this ceremony, which takes place on Sunday, April 16, they will receive their own *Siddur* (prayer book).

In fourth grade, family treasures will take the form of sharing special customs and recipes. This program will culminate with creating a family vision for Tikkun Olam (repairing the world). In fifth grade will begin to explore leadership through Hillel's famous quote "If I am not for myself who will be for me? If I'm not for others, what am I? And if not now, when?". In sixth grade, students will focus on the concept on the value of remembrance and explore the Sabbath, our Exodus from Egypt, and the Holocaust.

By seventh grade, our students and their families will be well prepared to embrace what it means to become *b'nai mitavah*. Each of the treasures, generated through these annual family learning activities, will be collected, and placed into a book, which they can keep and cherish for life.

This multi-generational and multi-disciplinary approach to learning and community is at the heart of my approach to directing the HCRJ religious school. My hope is that over the course of each child's Jewish education and identity formation, bonds will be established between our children and their parents, our children and their community, and our children and God.

Together, we are creating something special!

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On November 18, HCRJ dedicated the beautiful Chanukiya above from the family of Juan and Susana Stern in memory of their daughter Jennifer Rinah Stern.
