Lessons From a Small Mountain Village in Croatia



As I write these words, Israel's war against Hamas continues to unfold without an endgame in sight or a sense of what might be next. It is in the context of this unfolding violence that the story I am about to share might generate a glimmer of hope in our darkened world.

In 2010, I was asked to be a part of a multi-faith trip to the Balkans. The purpose of this trip was to use the complex history of this region as a lens through which we might better understand the strengths and weaknesses of Houston's diversity. The trip was designed to allow each of its participants (7 ministers, a rabbi, and a

Muslim community organizer) to interact with individuals who were dedicating their lives to helping their countries heal after one of the most brutal wars in modern history.

Through our interactions with community leaders, who for three years had been engaged in constant battle with their neighbors, we came to understand some of the essential components involved in building trust and understanding in a post-war society. The stories they shared challenged us, as clergy, to find ways to avoid the pitfalls of violence in the city of Houston by preemptively combating hatred together. These interactions also presented a kind of cultural and moral mirror reflecting common post-war challenges around the globe. The historical context of this moral mirror represents an important model for us as we seek to imagine a post-war reality in Israel and Gaza. Before WWI, Jews, Christians, and Muslims lived peacefully in the Balkan Peninsula. For generations, faith and ethnic diversity created a rich cultural tapestry rooted in respect and tolerance.

With the collapse of the Austro-Hungarian Empire at the end of World War I, Yugoslavia was established as a new nation state which brought six ethnic groups together. They spoke a common language, Serbo-Croatian, but they had different histories, different beliefs, and distinct identities. These elements of diversity, which had not been an issue in the past, suddenly became divisive as each group sought power in a region riddled with the rise of nationalism.

After World War II, Yugoslavia was subdivided along ethnic lines into six republics. It was forcibly held together under the communist dictatorship of Tito. During these years, all ethnic and religious tensions were suppressed. When Tito died, communist Yugoslavia split violently as the republics fought to establish themselves as sovereign countries. This violent split led to three years of brutal wars, and neighbors who had been living side by side for generations, were now killing each other based on their religious and ethnic identities.

Our trip took place almost two decades after this war as the people in each of these newly formed nations were trying to find a way back to the peaceful coexistence of their past. It was against the backdrop of deliberate efforts to reestablish a shared society that we listened to powerful stories of forgiveness, compassion, and hope. The most impactful of these stories took place in Fuzine, a quaint mountain village in the northern end of the Dalmatian coast of Croatia.

There, our group listened to a former governor and a local radio producer share an extraordinary tale of resistance, which proved to be the foundation of a pocket of peace in a region consumed by hatred, suspicion, and violence.

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
In 1991, during the height of the war, the municipal leaders of all the villages (Serb and Croat alike) made a bold and daring calculation. They approached the base commanders of a Yugoslavian Army base and sought to establish a relationship with them. After several meetings, it became clear that none of them wanted to shoot at each other or to be shot. So they made a written agreement that articulated "terms" of coexistence. For example, when the army was required to fire on the villages, per orders from up the chain of command, they agreed to warn the citizens ahead of time and instruct them on how to survive the barrage. They even provided maps of the mines they laid.

The city leader's did the same. When they were forced, by public opinion and the radical fringe, to fire on the base, the local radio producer treated the army base as another "village" and reported critical information to ensure their safety. When radical elements in the villages broke the agreement by firing on the soldiers, city leader immediately called the families of wounded soldiers to apologize and did so publicly on the radio. Media reports stayed ahead of hateful propaganda and rumor mills, and they sought to report events in ways that would minimize the inflammatory impact of the angry rhetoric coming from other sources.

Because of the extraordinary bravery and commitment from people on both sides, no one from the district was killed and no one was taken captive. This story is a remarkable tale of resistance through compassion. It is an example of how shared concerns for human life and dignity can be driving forces behind morally grounded political solutions.

On a personal note, this story continues to be a major factor in the multi-faith work I have pursued as a rabbi in Houston, and it has had a major impact on how I understand the power of forgiveness, compassion, and empathy during times of duress.

As we consider the unfolding war against Hamas, this story from a small mountain village in Croatia can provide us with a guiding light in this time of extreme darkness. While the context of the war in Gaza may be different, the facts on the ground are the same. For when the war is over, two peoples will need to live side by side after violently killing each other for months. As we learn from the dedicated people from Fuzine, this is something that can be done. Let us all pray that this day comes soon.


